On the way

As a church, we are, in Rev Dr John Mavor's words, *Together on The Way*. Sometimes, though, we need a reminder about what The Way actually means, whether for us as a congregation, as a denomination, or as individuals.

Rev Ruth reminded us, on Sunday 23rd April, that the way of following Jesus in the post-resurrection era does not always run smoothly; in fact, it often results in pain and failure. She pointed out that we can measure our faithfulness and our progress as church not by our muscles but by our scars.

I reflected on my recent walks, both in the north of England and, more recently, on the Camino de St Anthorpe, as I heard Ruth's message. In England, I walked sometimes on a paved, straight but very narrow path, like the one shown. At other times, I had to negotiate "step" stiles reached through a muddy puddle. There were "squeeze" stiles in dry stone walls with stone steps requiring good balance for safe passage. "Ladder" stiles offered another kind of access. But no matter the style of stile, the fact remained that negotiating them was a challenge, involving patience and faith. The opportunities for falling, tripping and ending up covered in sticky mud were ever present.

Similarly, progress on the way of the Cross means facing such challenges with trust and determination. Sometimes the challenges we face on our way mean we need to squeeze through the gaps between hard circumstances. Sometimes the way involves climbing over obstacles that may lie across the path, obstacles that may cause dismay or doubt; yet, climbing over them may enable us to see beyond, as a new and more hopeful vista opens up before us, calling us to obey the call of Jesus to follow him. It often takes some effort to open these, balanced on one foot at the top of a narrow stone block, but we rely not on our own strength or faculties; rather, our strength and courage derive from our faith in the One whose way we follow.

On the May long weekend, along with three other Lifeworks folk, and several others, I undertook to walk the Camino de St Anthorpe. Walking this path was a lot more straightforward than walking on the paths in England and Scotland. For a start, I find it much easier to walk on clean decomposed granite than on the heavy clay or peaty mud of the UK. Then there was the simple fact of walking with a group of like-minded pilgrims. Furthermore, the gradients were much kinder than some of those I encountered on my most ambitious days in the Yorkshire Dales and the Lake District. Under the spiritual guidance of Rev Heather den Houting, we walkers on the Granite Belt were encouraged to walk as much as possible in silence (a trial for some of us) while matching our breathing or our pacing to breath-prayers that we could adopt, using the resources Heather gave us each morning.

I found this helpful, after matching my crunching footfalls to the words *God alone is enough*. While not encountering any of the quirky stiles or dry stone walling of the UK, I did think about them as I walked. The stiles were not really obstacles, but means of access to what was on the other side of the wall. The stones encountered on the Camino de St Anthorpe were much more familiar and pleasing to my eye, and a reminder to me of how solid is God's trustworthiness, how reliable his promises, and how great is his creative might.



Inspiration for this article came from Annette. Although she is now "legally blind", she was able to make out the images from my recent trip that I showed her on the big TV in her room at Palm Lake Care. She commented on the number of different stiles I had encountered during my walks in the north of England. Annette told me that I should use these to write something about the way. So here it is.
