#### Persecution or indifference, and in this case, which is worse?

Being a huge sports fan, I have of course been watching a lot of Olympics over the past week. It has not escaped me that there has been some controversy regarding this Olympics due to the opening ceremony, and a scene from that ceremony which seemed to bear more than a cursory resemblance to the Last Supper as depicted by Leonardo da Vinci.

Many Christians have taken offence at this tableau, and have seen in this, an intent to mock the Christian faith on the part of the creators. The creators of the tableau have said that was not their intent, as they were attempting to depict an ancient Greek *bacchanalia*, and that the resemblance was accidental, but an apology was duly issued by the organisng committee for, 'unintentional offence'.

This leaves us with two possibilities - either that the creators are lying about their intent, and the scene was a deliberate parody of the Last Supper, or that the creators of the scene are so unfamiliar with or indifferent to Christian symbolism that this resemblance passed them by.

Of course many Christians find the first possibility concerning. I understand that concern, but when I look at the history of the Christian faith, something emerges which is relevant, that persecution has not destroyed the church, but has in fact made it stronger. Much of the New Testament is reflective of this reality, and the history of the church in many places across the world speaks of the church growing in the face of persecution. We should also be reminded that if this is persecution it is *merely* persecution by parody, so while I would be concerned about those who perhaps intentionally created a parody, and then deliberately lied about that, I am less concerned about a parody in itself. Christians are facing and have faced much worse in our history. If we are to get upset about persecution, perhaps there are more deserving causes in this world than an Olympic ceremony.

I also believe that we should give the benefit of the doubt that this wasn't the intent, that is, to take the creators word for it, unless we have good reason not to take their word for it. In this case, I do not think we have sufficient reason not to take their word for it. That seems to me to be the Christian thing to do, if we are to treat the creators with love, grace and charity, rather than suspicion and cynicism.

So, the second possibility remains, that this was accidental, and that no-one involved with the event was sufficiently cognizant of the resemblance of the tableau to the Last Supper for it to raise any alarm bells.

I actually think this is more concerning, and the reason why is that it reflects an indifference to Christianity, and that indifference I think is reflective of the decline of the church in the West. We may reflect that it is not persecution that has shrunk many churches in Australia, but indifference. The indifference of a culture which has become unfamiliar with Christianity, and I'm sorry to say, the indifference of Christians who do not care about the mission of God.

So, this reflection ends (or begins) as all good Christian reflections should do, by encouraging us not to look so much upon the perceived faults of others, but to look within our own hearts, and to recognise the ways in which we have grown indifferent to Jesus.

As we look within, let us ask for the transforming grace of Christ to remake our hearts, to burn with holy passion for Christ and his ways.

This Sunday 4th August we will be thinking of this, and asking God to re-awaken our spiritual hunger for Christ and a world renewed.

# An update From Rev Jenny Potter

Many Lifeworks members will know Jenny who worshipped with our congregation for three years, before accepting the call to minister in Longreach and surrounds. Here is an update from Jenny of her adventures so far:

Greetings from Central Western Queensland! Would you believe I've been here for 10 weeks now? Rusty and I are beginning to settle in. I still have a few boxes to empty and some things to find homes for, but the place is liveable even if I can't remember which cupboard I've put things in.

I've found a tenant for my house in Toowoomba and it seems to be going well.

I've been getting to know the people and places out this way, particularly Rev Donna Muston and her husband Rodney, based in Barcaldine. Together we have responsibility for the whole of the Central West, four preaching places including a weekly morning service in Longreach and three times a month in the afternoon at Barcaldine. We also occasionally take a Saturday service at the Anglican Church in Winton, and I will be doing that for the first time later in July.

Once a month we have a trip around to the Saturday 11 am service at Blackall, Sunday 9 am at Alpha and back for Sunday 1pm at Barcaldine. It's almost like going back in time as the Alpha church still has a bed in the vestry for visiting ministers. Rusty comes along as my guard dog in case there's anyone lurking about outside. I don't know what he'd do about anyone up to no good, but at least I'd know that they were there! He's getting more settled in the car now, until I come into a town and slow down, when he starts getting excited again. He likes coming to church and meeting people.

I've had a few calls up to the hospital so feeling quite at home there. It's only 15 beds, so it won't take as long to get to know the staff as in Toowoomba.

The other ministers around Longreach are also very welcoming. We meet monthly, alternating business and a coffee catch up. I love a place where the churches pray for and support each other. I've joined the Salvo's singles' games night to get to know people around town, a good mix of ages and I enjoy the mental stimulation.

Other than that it's getting used to the activities of the church and the towns and where connections can be made. Now that we have two ministers we're looking at how we can best arrange things between us, and where technology can assist us to reach across the geography more effectively.

It takes a while to get to know a new place, but it's slowly coming into focus. On my way back from Presbytery in Rockhampton I stopped at a cafe in Alpha for lunch and ran into a member of our congregation. I've found a hairdresser, a bakery, a dog groomer and a spectacular burger joint. I know that Saturday mornings are a good day to get chicken necks for dog food and UHT milk before stocks run out. The place starts to feel like home.
